

# Lead Worshiper 101:

Lesson 1: Our Roles As Lead Worshipers



We create an *environment* that *encourages* people to worship.



...you are a chosen people. You are royal priests, a holy nation, God's very own possession. As a result, you can show others the goodness of God, for he called you out of the darkness into his wonderful light.

1 Peter 2:9: (NLT)



Priests worship God and help others worship God.



Put the Levites in charge of the Tabernacle of the Covenant, along with all its furnishings and equipment. They must carry the Tabernacle and all its furnishings as you travel, and they must take care of it and camp around it.

Numbers 1 (NLT)



The Levites were essentially *setting up the place* where God and man would meet.



We *create a space* for God and his gathered people to meet.



You help *steward* the meeting place between your congregation and God.



When we come together as a local church, we help and encourage the congregation to worship God by setting the right environment.



As priests, we help *create an environment* for God and man to meet, and we do this...



We are worshiping God.

We are leading the congregation.



A word that is often translated into "worship" in scripture is the Greek word *Latreuo*.

And it means "ministering to God."



We think of ministering as "attending to the needs of someone."



He desires us, his people to do what they were created to do—*enjoy him and his presence*.



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So when we are serving on the platform, we are seeking to enjoy Him, and help others enjoy Him.



Through singing, physical expression, and/or playing a musical instrument.



We're also worshiping God by serving.

We can't forget the dual role that we play.



We choose to worship, even if we don't feel like it.

That doesn't mean it's act of pretending. It just means it's an act of our will.



We must *submit our personal worship preferences* for the sake of ministering to the gathered congregation.



At times, our personal worship expressions might *distract* from the corporate worship experience.



Even if you're not the upfront, main worship leader, you still have some responsibility to *engage the congregation*.



What's distracting in your church would be perfectly acceptable in another.



We model and encourage worship.



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We go first.



As we model what appropriate worship expression looks like, *we invite others* to worship with us.



We prepare to do lead the congregation with *confidence*.



We can't invite others to a place we're not prepared to go to.



We accept and lead from the *authority delegated to us*.



We also have authority as the children of God.



We are New Testament priests: We create a space for God and his gathered people to meet.



You help *steward the meeting place* between your congregation and God.



We minister and serve both God and the congregation.



We need to lead with the *confidence* that comes from *being prepare* AND *knowing our authority* that we've been given.



We model worship by going first.



We need to *lay aside our personal preferences* in order to lead the congregation.
